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

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


Rashmika Mandanna on rising from financial hardship: In my heart, I am still that girl who could not even buy a toy



"I don't think it's too late,"

Oscar-winning composer A R Rahman and his wife Saira Banu have decided to separate after nearly three decades of marriage. The composer shared the news on his X account on Wednesday, where he stated that while they had hoped to reach their 'grand 30', life had other plans. 'We had hoped to reach the grand thirty, but all things, it seems, carry an unseen end. Even the throne of God might tremble at the weight of broken hearts. Yet, in this shattering, we seek meaning, though the pieces may not find their place again. To our friends, thank you for your kindness and for respecting our privacy as we walk through this fragile chapter,' read his post on X.

Their children daughter Khatija and son Ameen also took to their Instagram Stories and requested 'privacy' during this time. 'We kindly request everyone to respect our privacy during this time. Thank you for your understanding,' he wrote. In a statement on behalf of the couple, prominent divorce lawyer Vandana Shah said they took the decision to separate after 'significant emotional strain in their relationship'. 'After many years of marriage, Mrs Saira has made the difficult decision to separate from her husband Mr AR Rahman. This decision comes after significant emotional strain in their relationship. Kamal@70: The Motto He Believes In




How does the great Kamal Haasan choose his films? What makes him say yes to a Vishwaroopam 2 or a Vikram?

On Kamal Haasan’s 70th birthday on November 7, we follow him on his recent celluloid excursions through this fascinating excerpt from K Hariharan’s book *Kamal Haasan: A Cinematic Journey*. Let us pause a moment to locate Kamal in his journey through Tamil cinema. In 2013, he took on the ambitious two-part project titled *Vishwaroopam I* where he played Wisam Ahmed Kashmiri, an Indian military agent delegated to eliminate a senior ISIS leader to protect the sovereignty of a world at severe risk of survival. Cut. Before he decided to don the greasepaint for *Vikram 2* in 2021, Kamal did an amazing film called *Papanasam* (Vanquishing One’s Sins; 2015), directed by Jiju Joseph, where he played an ordinary satellite cable TV agent named Suyambulingam, who accidentally gets involved in a murder and tries to save himself and his family from the fallout. This film was

a phenomenal box office hit, asserting Kamal’s capability to channelise a good script into a more superior form of cinema through his convincing performance. While *Papanasam* (a remake of the Malayalam hit *Drishyam*), was a delicate Hitchcockian family thriller, *Vishwaroopam* attempted to give Indian cinema a very nuanced Rambo/James Bond-like experience in a global. After *Papanasam*, Kamal headed out to finish an old commitment, *Vishwaroopam 2* in which Wisam tries to balance the guilty emotions of a good military man having to sort out interpersonal issues in the forces with the need to enter the chambers of a cruel ISIS tyrant/leader and eliminate him and his global associates. This film, though, turned out to be a box-office disaster. Surely this would have put Kamal in a quandary. Would the market allow for another actor-dominated film like *Papanasam* to become a success? Or should it be a film dedicated to sheer action-domination, the current market favourite genre? Kamal chose the latter. With his penchant for experimentation,

the time had also come for him to enter a new arena with a more global formula, namely the big-budget super-action drama. Kamal reopened *Vikram*, an older franchise of his company, by announcing the production of *Vikram 2* in 2021 to navigate the spectacle of excess, such as in the fantastic sci-fi world virtually propelled by Marvel Studios’ ‘Cinematic Universe’, which dominates theatres and OTT platforms across the world with multi-star casts, lavish sets, extensive use of computer graphics, loud music and thrilling action sequences.



The villain in *Vikram 2*, Sandhanam, is a clownish Joker-like character played by Vijay Sethupathi. The Joker in the DC Universe is often considered Batman's antithesis. While Batman is driven by a desire for justice, the Joker operates without a clear motive, only wanting to spread chaos. The Joker's existence serves to highlight and challenge Batman's own principles and beliefs. In *Vikram 2*, Sandhanam, introduced like a hulk, plays a narcotic drug manufacturer, producing cocaine on a 'massive scale', who supposedly has the power of destroying not only India but the whole world. The story remains silent on the veracity of such high-volume drug business in 'real' India. And we have all accepted that clarifying such information is not necessary at all. Fake news has become reality. The masquerade or secrecy surrounding such 'mythological' characters and organisations ends up serving as a narrative tool to explore the themes of power, responsibility and accountability.



In *Vikram 2*, a local drug lord's daughter's marriage scene shows Sandhanam waiting to attack while cooks sing out cookery ads and visitors dance to popular music. In such a bizarre intersection, masked men (headed by Kamal, also in a mask) enter on motorcycles, wipe out Sandhanam's men and even end up kidnapping the drug lord. The portrayal of unregistered or 'secret' national security forces can be interpreted as a commentary on real-world concerns related to government secrecy, classified operations and the lack of transparency. But does it resolve the balance between national security imperatives and the public's right to know in any tangible manner? No. The narrative thus mimics the opacity of existing news media, mostly packed with opinions and even fake news.

Superhero narratives have a long history of reflecting and commenting on



contemporary social and political issues. The portrayal of secret national security forces may resonate with concerns about the expansion of government surveillance, but the use of covert military operations and the implications of unchecked power in the real world provide a new level of credibility for modern-day governments. I am sure that Kamal is aware of such dangerous intersections and implications in real-day politics, where he is a committed player, and therefore the structuring of logic and reasoning into a film like this becomes important.



One can clearly see this in the insertion of a scene with Vikram's chosen members where he delivers a five-minute-long sermon about his rationale for doing whatever is being staged in the film. The setting is a dim basement packed with all kinds of ammunition. Vikram's team members are feeling unsure about the plan and he replies, 'So, you think I am doing all this to take revenge for my son's murder? My son died to give us a drug-free society. Should we not respect his sacrifice? This drug will soon take us back to the law of the jungle, namely, to multiply and procreate with no awareness of who your mother, sister or daughter is. You all came to me because of an ideology. Whoever we have killed is not murder, but a statement to clean the crap out of our society. And a masked face is necessary nowadays to carry out even a good deed. I am an agent and known for my secrecy. I have

a successful track record which I cannot reveal to the world because I am an honest militant. And our society should know that is the legacy we want to leave behind and for that Sandhanam must be killed. One man's terrorism is another man's revolution. The freedom song of yesteryears has become our national anthem today. Rebel is not a curse word, but a virtue. Sorry boys, I am lecturing. We are warriors of tomorrow but now, grow up, guys!'



The Preamble to our Constitution assures for all citizens 'justice, social, economic and political' and a rejection of violence as a means to achieve justice. With this 'statement' in the film, is Kamal propagating the need for violence as a contingent measure when law and order go out of hand? Or is he announcing the new 'Wagnerian' narrative as the norm? Acknowledging this monologue in the film as a 'lecture' is in fact Kamal's statement to his audience. Most of the lines spoken here are in the English language, subtitled in Tamil. Watching so much English spoken here and in many other Tamil films today is a clear indication of the 'surplus enjoyment' provided. Finally, the tone and delivery of Vikram's speech here is a tribute to the legendary Sivaji Ganesan, Kamal's idol.

Registering such a memory also portrays Kamal's disposition to the well-proven narrative, namely, the need to clearly register the hero as a 'positive' person with no ambiguity at all which, strangely, is clearly not the narrative of the Hollywood superhero films. Kamal has surfed and navigated a lot of tidal waves, manoeuvring the peaks and troughs, combining rare intelligence and commonly available intuitions to overcome unimaginable crises all his life. There is no looking back at the past, for his only motto has been 'Tomorrow belongs to us!'

'Kamal Got Me Hooked On To Fitness'

Among Kamal Haasan's many friends and colleagues is Gulshan Grover. The 'Bad Man' was at Kamal Haasan's birthday party last year, as both of them had been shooting for Indian 2 at the time and shared with the other guest at the party, Mani Ratnam how delighted he was to reunite with his Nayakan hero after three decades for Thug Life. As Kamal Haasan turns 70 on November 7, Gulshan tells about the 43-year-friendship that began on the set of Sadma and the lessons he learnt from him, particularly during the fight scenes. "Kamal not only gave me tips on how to overpower an actor bigger and stronger than you, but also gave me the knee and elbow pads he had brought for himself from abroad. These imported pads made wrestling on the rough terrain smooth. Kamal, who had sacrificed his protective gear, ended up with the bruises, but made a permanent place in my heart."

Kamal has changed...



I was shooting with Kamal Haasan after many years and was understandably nervous on the first day of Indian 2's shoot. I recalled from the Sadma days that Kamal, who is a fantastic actor and well-versed in technique, would just get up from his chair, walk through the rehearsals and be ready for a take in a jiffy. I, on the other hand, like to prepare well. Since I'm playing his adversary in

this film, I knew I had to have my game on point and be ready to take him on without too many rehearsals. But to my surprise, I discovered that Kamal had changed. The most wonderful actor India had ever seen, who surprises you in every film, leaving you wonder-stuck with not just his versatility but also his ability to carry off action, emotion, dance, drama and comedy, industriously rehearsed every scene with me several times. Brushing off all the praise heaped on him, the flood of compliments he is deluged with, Kamal Haasan works as hard and industriously as any newcomer even today, to get into character and understand what is required of him. When I was stuck while we were doing a scene together, he acted out my portions for me and put me back on track. When I pointed out that he should emphasise a particular aspect in a scene, giving the audience another perspective, he accepted my suggestion with grace and incorporated it. There was a lot of give and take between us which made the God of acting not just more human. This has also taken his films one step up. Last year, at the age of 69, Kamal Haasan gave Tamil cinema its biggest hit, Vikram, which underlines not just his star power, but also his hunger to excel.

Birthday memories



As far as our personal equation goes, I was gratified to find that the warmth and respect we have always had for each other, had not diminished. If anything, it has grown. From the first day to the 14-15 days that we shot together at a stretch, we were always together. While on camera we were adversaries, off it, we were the best of buddies. He kept the chair next to him for me and between shots, we were always chatting and laughing. This surprised his younger colleagues down South who, not being as well acquainted with the work I've done, had had no idea the Bad Man is also a big name in my part of the world. When they saw how caring and affectionate the legend was towards me, insisting I eat whatever was brought out for him and ensuring I had wanted for nothing during the duration of the shoot, it elevated my own standing on the Indian 2 set. Kamal invited me, along with a small circle of close friends, to his birthday party last year. There I met old friends like Khushboo and Radhika, as well as his younger daughter Akshara. Mani Ratnam and his wife Suhasini were there too and I told the director how delighted I was that Kamal and he were reuniting, three decades after their cult classic Nayakan. Their Thug Life is a film I am really looking forward to. I also noticed that when a childhood friend kept butting into his conversations, Kamal showed not the slightest hint of irritation. It is these qualities of humility, humanity and magnanimity, along with him being the fantastic actor that he is, that I gave an impromptu speech on the occasion.

Jogging to fitness and wisdom


On the second day of the Indian 2 shoot, Kamal admitted that on his way back, he had remembered our fun times from Sadma. Kamal,



who by then was already a legend, and Romu N Sippy, whose father, N C Sippy had produced wonderful films like Padosan, Guddi, Anand, Bawarchi, Chupke Chupke, Mili, Gol Maal and Khubsoorat, had befriended me, then a struggling actor. Sadma, directed by Balu Mahendru, released on July 8, 1983. Balu's first Hindi film was a remake of his 1982 Tamil film, Moondram Pirai. It is a beautiful love story with Sridevi as Nehalata, who after suffering head injury in a car crash regresses to a six year old as a result of retrograde amnesia, and Kamal's Somu, a lonely school teacher who rescues her from a brothel, brings her home and loses his heart to her. I had lucked out when my eyes caught Balu's eyes and he called Romu, insisting that he wanted me to play the baddie, Balua. Romu, who was producing the film with his brother Raj N Sippy, was surprised because another actor, a bigger name, had already been signed for the role of the local woodcutter. But Balu was adamant he wanted only me. When I met him at his office at Roop Tara Studio in Mumbai, Romu was very gracious and we signed the contract that very day. During the shoot in Ooty, I stayed with Romu, who was there throughout, in his two-bedroom suite. Every evening, after pack-up, I would go for a jog with Kamal and him. Kamal was the one who got me hooked on fitness and I took the opportunity to ask him a lot of questions on acting and the craft of cinema. Given his years of experience and fund of knowledge, it was wisdom time for me. All his tips and guidance have come in handy down the decades.

Padding up a fight

I was really nervous about our fight scene. After learning about Balua's attempt to molest Nehalata, whom he has christened Reshmi, Somu goes at him hammer and tongs. Kamal insisted



I make it as real as possible and assured me that I would not get hurt, saying reassuringly, 'If there is a boulder and we are rolling towards it, I will make sure I hit it first and cushion the impact for you.' He not only gave me tips on how to overpower an actor bigger and stronger than you but also gave me the knee and elbow pads he had brought for himself from abroad. These imported pads made wrestling on the rough terrain smooth. Kamal, who had sacrificed his protective gear, ended up with the bruises, but made a permanent place in my heart. My admiration and learning which began on sets of Sadma and continues to this day.

Lessons in Tamil and Hindi



On the set, Kamal, Sridevi and Balu would discuss scenes in fluent Tamil. Suddenly, noticing the blank look on my face, Kamal would stop and translate all that had been said in English for me. Balu would urge me to learn Tamil, and Kamal succeeded in teaching me a smattering of the language. A couple of days into the Sadma shoot, some of my suggestions impressed Balu and he gave me the additional responsibility of coaching Kamal, Sridevi and Silk Smitha in their Hindi dialogues. Our director was dictated by the location and the weather. If a particular place or the lighting at a certain point during the day caught his

fancy, he would rush out his actors and technicians and shoot without any prep. He barely gave his actors time to get into their costume and at times told Sridevi not to bother with make-up. During such times, it was my job to read out their lines to the actors and make sure they spoke them with the right diction, accent and pronunciation. If you look at my photographs from the set, you will always find me with a file in hand, even when I am in my costume. While Kamal and Sridevi were diligent about their Hindi dialogue, Silk Smitha, while always respectful, was not too interested in her lines or my instructions. She was one of the busiest stars at the time and on the day that she was to arrive, I would be left behind at the hotel to narrate the scenes to her and go over the lines before she was driven to the set. I don't think she realised I was one of the actors till Sadma's release.

The disguise I saw through

Kamal and I did another film, T Rama Rao's Yeh Desh, the following year. It is the Hindi remake of Krishna's 200th Telugu film, Eenadu. I was living in a building called Krishna at the time and one morning, when I went to the nearby baniya shop to make a call, I noticed a guy in dark glasses grooving to music playing on his Walkman. I looked at him closely, he stared back and I recognised him from his eyes. 'Kamal,' I muttered, he ignored me. 'Kamal,' I repeated, and this time he shushed me, asking, 'How did you recognise me?' I pointed out that I was an actor too and understood body language. Coincidentally, I had just bumped into our Sadma co-star, Sridevi, outside Mumbai's Seth Studio where she was shooting for Rakesh Roshan's Jaag Utha Insaan. When I mentioned this, Kamal immediately asked me to take him to her hotel. 'Let's rag her,' he said, and I thought to myself that he being the legendary Kamal Haasan and having done several films with her could do so, but it wouldn't be right for me to be a part of the prank too. But I could not say no to Kamal and reluctantly escorted him there. Kamal was still in his Afro disguise having planned to play the same prank on her. I heaved a sigh of relief when I learnt that Sridevi was not in her room. On Kamal's birthday, all these memories come flooding back. I wish for him to always be happy, healthy and move from strength to strength, as an actor and film-maker.

He looks back at the film and tells "Hopefully, for the next one, I can do something that I might not have done before."

Abhishek, that career-defining performance as a man who won't let death win, where does all the pain come from?

Thank you very much. I hope every actor gets to do work that is going to be career-defining with every film they choose to do. That's the attitude with which you should approach each and every one of your films. I'd like to do that with every film of mine.

As far as where the pain and suffering come from, we're actors. This is what we do. We listen to the direction given to us by our director, in this case, Shoojitda (Sircar). The entire credit I have to give him. I've just been a puppet in his hands.

How did your equation with Jayant Kriplani happen?

Jayant is a wonderful person and an even better actor. He's so natural and effortless. It made watching him perform a pleasure.

When you're working with such accomplished and wonderful actors, it makes your job so easy. I think the characters are so well-defined and such polar opposites that it makes it very easy.

Jayant and you bring a lot of humour to grim situations.

Keeping Shoojitda's perspective on film-making, he likes to find something funny, something that you can chuckle at in the most serious of situations. I really think that, you know, Dr Deb, Jayantda's character, is the perfect foil for my character, Arjun

Sen. For all the drama that Arjun likes to do, he's as serious about it. It's such a wonderful board to bounce off. And he made me look so good.

You share a real bond with your screen daughter, played by Pearl Dey.

I was surrounded by wonderful actors. When you have that kind of talent around you, it makes you look good, whether you deserve to or not.

Well, yes, Pearl has done a great job. Not just Pearl, even Ahilya, who plays the older version of my daughter, has done a wonderful job and I thoroughly enjoyed working with both of them. I cannot take credit for the chemistry at all. It's entirely up to them and Shoojitda for creating that.

Is this a new beginning for you?

I don't know how to answer that. You look for new horizons.

You try to push your envelope. You want to look at doing something more challenging for the next one. That's what we try to do and try to achieve. As far as new beginnings and all that, I leave that to my learned audience. They're the final deciders of what is good and what is bad. I humbly respect and accept what they have to say.

Hopefully, for the next one, I can do something that I might not have done before.

Did you refer to your own bonding with your daughter Aaradhya?

I think every actor always, whether you know it or not, but I think subliminally, somewhere reference your own life. I think the natural process of thought is to think, what would I do in this situation? But the credit of the chemistry has to go entirely to Shoojitda, Ahilya and Pearl.

Did you meet the real Arjun Sen?

I met him about 10 to 15 days into the shoot. He came to LA, where we were shooting and spent a lot of time with me. A wonderful guy and, you know, he lived up to be the true inspiration that his life has been. Very insightful, very facetious, great sense of humour, very, very, witty. He refuses to see the downside of life.

He's very positive and I really, really, enjoyed being with him.

Is the real Arjun happy with the reel Arjun?

I think that's a question best asked to him. I'd like to believe he's proud and happy with my work.

How much prep did you undertake?

Well, Shoojitda's prep was unique and a nice, refreshing change for me. In the three to four months of preparation that we did, I think we only read two scenes. We did not do the conventional script readings.

We spent two, three months where he would just talk to me about life, philosophy, spirituality, and a lot of things, which I slowly realised was him trying to get into my head and understand the kind of person I was and therein trying to mould how he wanted my Arjun Sen to think and to behave.


It was a wonderfully new approach. It was not very direct prep, so to speak. It was more about getting into the mindset and being comfortable being this person.

What is your takeaway from this experience?

I think when you have the persistence and tenacity that Arjunda has, by just the actions of what he does in life, I think it becomes very easy to portray it. His journey is very inspirational. Once you buy into that, it makes it very easy to portray.

Arif, given your surprising physical resemblance to Jinnah and your brilliant performance in Freedom At Midnight, one wonders if Nikkhil Advani was the first film-maker to approach you to play him?

No, Mr (Shyam) Benegal was the first gentleman to offer me the role of Jinnah. In fact, he

approached me twice. Once, was for a TV show he was doing, maybe Samvidhaan: The Making of the Constitution of India. The second time it was for a long sequence featuring Jinnah in Mujib: The Making of a Nation, the biopic of Bangabandhu, Sheikh Mujibur Rahman. There were offers for a few stray Web shows and films too.

I have no idea why I was so many film-makers’ choice for Jinnah. I assume it is because I was born and bred in Mumbai and speak English. There’s also my name, people tend to believe that a Muslim character can best be played by a Muslim actor. None of these offers materialised for whatever reasons. I guess I was fated to play Jinnah in such a vast, expansive way in Freedom

At Midnight.

Let’s flashback to the audition...

Nikkhil, fortunately, did not put me through an elaborate audition. I remember he made me read a scene in his office. It’s the one in the first or second episode where Jawaharlal Nehru comes to Jinnah’s house asking him to join the government. Even though I was on the leaner side then, I had to lose some weight for the series because Jinnah was ailing and very frail then. But I was pretty much there in the physicality and fortuitously, things fell in place.

What was the first day of the shoot like?

Well, we shot the scene which

comes in episode seven when a young Gandhi comes to a Gujarat sabha and is welcomed by a young Jinnah. It's a big scene where Jinnah introduces Gandhi, who starts speaking in Gujarati, and runs him down.

There's an awkward confrontational moment between the two when they were young. It being the first day of shoot, the heart was pounding. Things have to be right, look good and the tone set, I know it takes time even if you have rehearsed ad nauseam in an air conditioned office or in the privacy of your home several times. This was on camera! Also, there was the smoking. I don't smoke so it took me a while to get used to tobacco. There were mini challenges, but everything worked out well in the end.

In the post release interviews, many of the actors admit playing a particular character gave them an understanding of the person. What's your understanding of Jinnah's ideology and has it changed after living him on screen?

Not really because once a shoot is over, I don't dwell too much on the psyche of the character. I perform a scene from the way it is written without getting too deep into his personal ideology. I'm already looking to my next role, there's no great resonance that I carry with me today. During those seven-eight months of shooting, I would perform in front of the camera, but there's nothing beyond that.

The reason I'm asking you this is that politics is an integral part of your family. Your uncle Rafiq Zakaria was a veteran Congress politician as was your father Ahmed Zakaria. Your brother Asif Zakaria is the Congress candidate from the Bandra West constituency of Mumbai on a Congress ticket. What is your take on contemporary politics and have you ever been drawn to it?


Politics interests and intrigues me, but as a bystander. A part of my family was and is in politics, so the curiosity is there. One could have preferences in terms of the choice of candidates, but that is one's personal journey. It's like asking what you eat and don't eat, not something that needs to be in the public domain.

Personally, I've been apolitical all my life.

Is India as secular as Gandhi wanted it to be?

I choose to believe it is.

There is a lot of noise because of social media. We tend to get a lot of information about a lot of conflict which has been there since the past 100 years or so. We are only becoming aware of it now in real time because of live news and social media, constantly scrolling and looking.

Known for her striking voice as well as acting talent, **Tia Bajpai** is making waves with her latest single, Jugni, which has millions of views on YouTube.

But Tia's journey has not been a walk in the park. She has faced her share of challenges, including the harsh realities of an industry often overshadowed by nepotism.

Jugni has been received really well.

As an artist, when your work is loved and appreciated by one and all, it truly feels heartwarming.

A lot of hard work has gone into making this track, and I couldn't have asked for more.

How did the song come into being?

Music and art is usually a reflection of who we are and what we feel around us. I rely a lot on my sensibilities when it comes to creating music for my audience and that's how the lyrics happened. It took me a long time to finalise the lyrics and after that, the collaboration with Arian Romal, who has composed the music for the song, happened. No venture is possible without

a successful collaboration and I am fortunate that my team had the same vision regarding the song.

You first rose to fame as a contestant on Sa Re Ga Ma Pa in 2005. How do you think reality shows have changed over the years? Are they still real?

Well, I am not sure about the 'reality' part of it. A lot of things have already been said and written about it. What I can truly say is that a music reality show doesn't guarantee you success. Yes, you will get that initial boost in your career; your Reels and YouTube channel may start going viral. But what after that? I feel that in today's times, a lot of artists lack the recall value, which wasn't the case back in the '90s or even 2000s. My motive behind every song is to always create that recall value which will prompt my audience to engage with my tracks again and again. Sometimes, the results happen the way I want and sometimes it doesn't. But then that's part and parcel of the industry. You can't take success or failure seriously. It's important to focus and move on quickly.

If given a chance, would you like to be a judge on a singing reality show?

It would be an honour. If there is any reality show and the makers feel that I would do justice as a judge and add value to their show, why not? Judging young and raw talent and preparing them for the industry would be my little way of giving it back to my industry and the arts community.

From Sa Re Ga Ma Pa, you transitioned into acting, starting with the popular ZEE TV show Ghar Ki Lakshmi Betiyann. What inspired you to take that leap from being a

singer to becoming an actress?

There was not a particular moment that made me do that. As an artist, right from my childhood, I have been inclined towards both music and acting. I have trained myself for both. So, if I am confident enough to do a decent job in both, why not?

You starred in the film, Haunted-3D.

Yes, there were multiple rounds of auditions, look tests and everything involved in the usual casting process. What worked for me was that I kept my expectations minimalistic. I was entrusted with a lot of faith by my director and was told that the role was tailor-made for me. So I had to do a decent job to keep up with that faith. I am happy it worked out the way I wanted.

After Haunted-3D and 1920: Evil Returns, you've been selective with your projects and have remained relatively away from the limelight. What factors contributed to that decision?

If you see my work portfolio, it has always been about quality ahead of quantity. I don't want to be remembered for hundreds of songs and movies, the majority of which don't have a recall value among the audience. I would rather have a lot less in terms of numbers but the quality should be such that in terms of sheer impact, it is equivalent to the work of a lot of people who are ahead of me. I need complete satisfaction before saying yes to anything. God has put me in a position to choose, so I am not in any rush.

You were offered Housefull 2. What led you to reject that film?

Yes, I was offered one of the films of the Housefull franchise and was happy that it came my way. But I wasn't comfortable with the idea of wearing a bikini. It was beyond my comfort zone and I will never go against my comfort zone to that extent in terms of outfits. So, it didn't work out and I refused the film.

When you look back at your journey, were there moments when you felt your lack of industry connections hindered your opportunities?

Absolutely. I am a self-made person and whatever I have been able to do for myself professionally, it is a direct result of my hard work. No one has set things up for me on a platter. Connections certainly help if you are someone who's born in the film industry. But then, I had two options: Either crib about the fact that I wasn't an insider in the industry or do my best with whatever I have. I chose the latter. We can't control where we are born, right? While it's wrong to blame insiders for their family background, there's no doubt that being an insider has tremendous advantages compared to being someone who's not. Being from a film family helps in getting the initial bit of work. Also, you get multiple opportunities even if you fail, while an outsider won't. But then, let's face it, that's how it has always been and that's how it will be. I am not someone who will blame nepotism.

What kind of roles or projects would excite you most?

Like I said, I don't believe in limiting myself to a certain type, be it with acting or music. Whatever it is, it has to challenge me as an artist. The joy of doing something right after you previously felt that you can't do it is the best feeling for an artist.

Where do you feel at home?


Now, it's Mumbai. But Srinagar somehow feels like home. Rainawari in Srinagar is where my father's side of the family is from.

So time management is a problem?



You have to prioritise your time and do what you must.

What do you have to say about the Karan Johar-Shah Rukh Khan combination?

I feel two hard working, talented people are bound to form a productive team. When these two people share a special familial camaraderie, there's

bound to be valuable emotions between them, and those emotions are bound to translate on screen. Shah Rukh and I work so well together because we care so deeply for each other in real life. Creativity compounded with brotherly love cannot go wrong.

Some of his biggest hits are under your direction?

I'm happy piggybacking on his stardom. There can never be an ego between us. I know only too well that he's successful way beyond what I can ever be. Stars don't get any bigger than Shah Rukh Khan or Amitabh Bachchan. Once a film-maker accepts that, ego never comes in the way. As a woman, mother, and film-maker, how do you view your journey so far?

I am filled with gratitude. Motherhood has given me a deeper emotional understanding of my work, helping me tell more honest and empathetic stories. Being a woman and film-maker in an industry that often isn't designed for us has pushed me to carve out my own

space. I'm fortunate to have had a wonderful support system and incredible collaborators along the way, and will always be grateful for that. Every chapter -- whether as a film-maker or a mother -- has shaped the other, and I'm thankful for the challenges and the joys that have come with them.

As a female film-maker, are you able to tell the stories you want to, exactly the way you envision them? Did you have to make any compromises in Laapataa Ladies?

I don't believe any film-maker should ever have to compromise on the story they set out to tell.

I don't think I could have found better collaborators than Aamir Khan Productions and Jio Studios, who empowered us throughout the entire process. Aamir was the one who discovered the story, and that alone speaks volumes about the kind of support we received.


If you had the chance to change anything in your life, would you?

One may not remember **Pratibha Sinha**, but her popular song in **Raja Hindustani** -- *Pardesi Pardesi Jana Nahin* -- is still heard on radio stations and at dance events.

As the film starring Aamir Khan and Karisma Kapoor clocks 28 years, just why she quit Bollywood: "The world we live in is by and large misogynistic. We are simple, rustic Nepali people."

Are you proud to be known as the Pardesi Girl?

Am I known as the Pardesi Girl?

Of course. The song became your calling card to fame.

I can't believe 28 years have gone by! It feels as though we were filming the song yesterday.

I recall Dharmesh (Darshan, Director) calling me up and telling me that he was keen on me performing a song in *Raja Hindustani*.

Didn't you fear you might go unnoticed in a film that starred Aamir Khan and Karisma Kapoor?

I trusted Dharmesh Darshan completely.

His parents and he had been our family friends and I knew him from the time I was a toddler.

So I agreed immediately.

I was aware of the fact that he was a very gifted and dedicated filmmaker, a sensitive and evolved human being who thought with his heart and felt with his mind.

Did you ever expect the song to become so popular?

When one is in the thick of things, one does not expect or even think of any kind of reaction.

Dharmesh had narrated the story to me and it was obvious that the song was propelling the story forward.

Why did you quit the industry?

To be honest, I was 'phased out' by the film industry. I guess I was and still am out of step with the rest of the world. The world we live in is by and large misogynistic. We are simple, rustic Nepali people. Mom (the legendary **Mala Sinha**, who turned 88 on Monday, November 11, 2024) trusted the wrong people, and let the wrong kind of elements get into our life. She is naive in many ways.

'I Am A Girl At The End Of The Day'

Bhool Bhulaiyaa 3 is the biggest career hit for its stars Vidya Balan and Kartik Aaryan, and they are obviously thrilled. Yet, post-release, Kartik seems to have become the face of the film, leaving the rest of the cast behind. Vidya, who has been in the industry for almost two decades, doesn't seem surprised and says "The industry and the media tend to equate the success of a hero driven film with the hero. That is the norm, right I think we have to change the way we think as an audience."

You are not an actor who would focus too much on vanity that typically comes with it. Is it then difficult for you to step into a flashy entertainer like this compared to a Sherni or a Jalsa?

Not at all. I do whatever is required for the role. Here, I had Niharika Bhasin doing my costumes and she's fantastic. She dressed me in The Dirty Picture and Shakuntala Devi. We get along very well. Plus, I had my team to make me look good. My makeup artist Harshal, my hair dresser Shalaka, they have all been with me forever. They know how to dress me according to the character. And when I say dress, it is make-up, hair, costume, everything. So yes, I enjoyed it. I enjoy dressing up. I enjoy having my hair open and done up and all that. I don't get to do that that often. But I am a girl at the end of the day.



After seeing you in BB3, I think you would kill it in a negative role. Your character has dark shades here and you were so good in showing that.

(Smiles) Thank you. I'd love to do it. It can be a fully negative character in a very entertaining film. I'm okay with that. As long as it's not dark and intense and brooding. But I really want to do comedy.



Are you actively seeking out roles that are light and fun?

Yes, yes, I am. People, who come to me with scripts, know that I am looking for something fun and entertaining. A lot of people are bringing that my way now.

You have done so many different roles across various genres. Is there any comfort space for you? A genre that makes you feel at ease.

No. I think I feel equally at ease and equally ill at ease in all genres because I just get nervous before a film. After a few days, you slowly slip into things, but it's never easy.



The entire star cast of BB3 came together to promote the film before its release. Now that it is doing great business, we see only Kartik Aaryan's face on posters flashing those big numbers.

Not to discredit Kartik, but how do you make peace with the fact that no matter what you achieve the men will have the upper hand?

The industry and the media tend to equate the success of a hero driven film with the hero. That is the norm, right? If the film is driven by a female hero, she ends up getting credit for it. Otherwise, it's the norm. I think we have to change the way we think as an audience, also. A film is a collaborative medium and therefore, I think I've always wondered about this. But having said that, I'm very happy for Kartik. Our film is doing well and he has worked very hard and continues to work hard. I'm amazed at his commitment that he's still going out there and promoting. I've gotten a little bit like, the film is going well so there's no need to do anything more. But he is at it and kudos to him for that. But yes, I think this is a mindset change that we all need to make.



From Parineeta to BB3, it's been a long and wonderful journey for you. Along the way, you have seen a lot, experienced a lot. What new changes do you hope to see in the industry?

I'm quite happy with the way things are, honestly. But I do hope that people start investing a little more fearlessly in female-led films. And make fun female-led films. That's the one thing I'm hoping for.

In the kitchen, he is the master chef of stories. Each of his dishes has an interesting backstory with a hint of nostalgia and a lot of emotion. When **Ranveer Brar** crossed over to films, the transition was natural.

His disarming personality and ability to warm up to people are evident in some of his flawless performances that we have seen on screen. But acting, Ranveer admits, "was never really part of any plan." Brar plays a grieving father whose child has been kidnapped in Hansal Mehta's *The Buckingham Murders*, which will start streaming on Netflix from November 8, and he shares his experience "Everything was challenging. One of the pressures was the fact that there's a director who's putting his reputation on you. It's an important film for him and he wants to give you an important role. That by itself puts a lot of responsibility on your shoulders"

What was the best part about working on *The Buckingham Murders*?

The best part was that surreal feeling that I got. There are few times in my life when I have felt overwhelmed with gratitude. For me, that was the best part -- moving from the kitchen to a film set. I have never been to a film school. Maybe making a short film somewhere was always a part of the plan, but not acting! Acting was never really a part of any plan. I think it has more to do with the manifest(ation) of the people who love me and care for me than me.

How did you prepare for your role in *The Buckingham Murders*?

I think my preparation mostly is just understanding the character. Fortunately, I've lived a fairly fruitful life with its successes and failures. I've always been a people watcher. I've always been interested in knowing and observing people. I think my bit of preparing for my character was

being the character -- understanding it, going to places in my head with my character.

Just like how I would go into the head of the person I'm cooking for -- how do I touch, move and inspire them? It's the same thing.

What was it like working with Kareena Kapoor?

It was great.

I think with Kareena, the lineage shows. The fact that you come from a family of film-makers is so deeply, intensely in your blood, it shows. Her love for the story -- be it understanding the story quickly or reading the script, then composing yourself in almost no time for the shot. All of it is just so natural to her. She is the epitome of effortlessness. The way she understood the medium and interacted with Hansal sir on things that she felt were relevant. The kind of preparation that she'd put in it -- maybe (she rehearsed it) months before and definitely the night before coming on the set the next day.

What was the most challenging part of working on a film like this?

Everything was challenging.

One of the pressures was the fact that there's a director who's putting his reputation on you. It's an important film for him and he wants to give you an important role. That by itself puts a lot of responsibility on your shoulders. There's gratitude, and then there's also the underlying responsibility to deliver. That was definitely weighing on my mind. Other than that, what eventually stayed with me was that the more difficult and unlike the characters you do, the more freeing it is. Because for somebody who wants to be free and not just be the Ranveer that everybody sees on camera, it's very freeing to do characters that are diametrically opposite to who you are (in real life). It's liberating.

What type of character roles interest you?

I am too new to pick and choose. I can only -- with folded hands -- thank people for whatever I'm getting. I think grey characters really excite me because then it's a much deeper internal conversation that I have to have with myself on every action. Sometimes you have to justify an action. Sometimes you have to convince yourself of an action, which, in normal life you wouldn't need to, because we love living our life in black and white. But yeah, beggars can't be choosers (laughs). I'm happy to see what life has in store for me.

You're a MasterChef and we know that Hansal Mehta is a foodie. Kareena is also a foodie. What kind of conversations would you have on the sets?


Hansal sir is not just a foodie, he is also a bonafide chef. I can explain a dish to him like I'd explain to my sous chef, not a novice. And he will get it. He gets the details and intricacies of cooking. He is not only fascinated with the end product that comes on the table, but also the process (of making it). That probably helps him to understand and guide me better on how to meet my character.

Ranveer Brar shares his favourite restaurants in and around Mumbai in this video:

Did you get to cook on the sets?

This was a very intense shoot, so cooking on the set was not possible. We were mostly shooting in real locations or at somebody's house. There was no time and no kitchen setup. But on off days, we probably cooked something together. Kabhi chicken bana liya, kabhi aloo ya gobi. On the last day, when we wrapped up, we cooked an entire feast for the crew -- him (Hansal Mehta) and I. We cooked chicken, mutton, we cooked biryani, lahari dal.

better space for not just actors but also technicians. "OTT has opened a very wide space for a lot of actors and technicians also," she says.

"There was either films or television that people were working on. This was true for actors and crew as well. And now we all have more job opportunities and more scope to do different kinds of roles. Now that she is all set to further her career in films, is there a dream character for Krystal? She says, "I like watching psychological thrillers. I would love to do a *Gone Girl*." Krystal says she is enjoying the current phase in her career where she is getting a lot of opportunities. "But," Krystal says... "I think my best is yet to come. This is the beginning."

Krystal D'Souza shot to stardom on television before starring in Hindi films like the Amitabh Bachchan starrer *Chehre* and Ritesh Deshmukh-Fardeen Khan's *Visfot*. Several actors who have been a part of the television industry have often talked about the difficult nature of the medium. From a hectic schedule of over 12 hours, no leave, monotony of work and the pressure of staying fit, there's a lot that television actors need to keep up with. Krystal harks back to her television days and says it was great "schooling" for her because of the "discipline" the medium teaches an actor. "Television

teaches you punctuality; it teaches you responsibility... I have learnt a lot from television," While many would try to shed the 'TV actor' tag because they are looking for roles in films or OTT shows, Krystal says she does not disassociate herself from television serials.

"I wouldn't mind going back to television. If there's something that is more progressive and more modern, I would love to do it," she says. Krystal made inroads into OTT in 2019 with Ekta Kapoor's show *Fittrat* and thinks OTT is instrumental for creating a
